A h, March...that single busiest time of year is here. Josh Rogers traveled to Anchorage, at his own expense, to cover the beginning of the Iditarod. Irene Houdek traveled by MARC mission plane to Mountain Village to record services of the ECCAK Conference. Neil went to Savoonga to cover the Bering Strait School District Basketball Tournament.

We've been shipping the recording gear to Get-Togethers in Shaktoolik, Mountain Village, Koyuk and Kiana to capture the worship music for



addition to our music library. Luda is in Anadyr, the capital of Chukotka, on

her way back to Provideniya. She is required to return to Russia every 90 days under her current Nanook Commission visitation permit. Please pray that she will receive her U. S. government issued 3-year Church Worker visa in the near future.

We sold-out basketball and Iditarod sponsorships again this year and additionally managed to barter a satellite phone for our use to cover the teams of Iditarod.

And we've begun scheduling summer work teams with a group of six from Tucson, AZ scheduled for May 30 and another from St. Petersburg, FL on June 9th. Thanks to each of you for all you do!



KICY is quickly approaching a point where the cost of power to operate the 50,000 watt transmitter will not be met if the current decline in donations continues.

Nome Joint Utilities has applied another Fuel Adjustment charge to our bills starting in February. KICY is also assessed a Peak Demand charge for our three-phase 480 volt service. We have petitioned the Utility for relief from our Peak Demand charge but, so far, no action has been taken. We also know that the fuel adjustment charge is across the board for every Nomeite. Between the Peak Demand and Fuel Adjustment charges, we pay an additional \$2,100.00 per month for electricity for the AM transmitter.

For the short term we have a remedy to keep KICY operating, but it would mean losing most of the hours we are broadcasting into

Russia.

Under current F.C.C. regulations, we cannot lower power without asking for an STA (Special Temporary Authority). These are not granted for financial considerations. We are permitted to simply turn the transmitter off between the hours of midnight and six am.

We could turn off the transmitter from 4 AM to 6 AM and gradually increase the hours until we are off the air from Midnight to 6:00 AM. That would give us only one hour of Russian Programming. Reducing service is obviously our last choice.

The first choice is for our financial supporters to rally to keep us broadcasting into Russia. We are suggesting that your Sunday School Class, Youth Group, or Church make a monthly faith promise for a year to offset our power costs. There

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My First Impressions.

ennis asked me if I would like to write an article with the first impressions of my experience here in Nome. As I've thought about my experience so far, one of my first impressions is "WOW! God has prepared me for being here".

I can only speak for myself, but my guess is I'm not alone. I fail to give God credit for the many things He does in my life, things that I think of as circumstances or just daily living. But I do want to give Him the credit for using circumstances and situations to prepare me for my time here in Nome. I also know that many of the things He's done have been in answer to prayer. Thank you to those who have been praying for me over the last months and the last year. God has been answering those prayers.

How has God prepared me? Well, here are a few areas. First, I have been a suburbanite my whole life, first in the Chicago area and then Denver. So far, I'm doing okay in Nome and I feel that I will be okay. Remember, this is my first impression. I don't know how I'll feel in 2 months or 6 months from now!

Second, I have lived in my own house and I'm now in a small apartment. God prepared me for this with the 2 Christian camp jobs

I worked at in 2004. Anyone who has spent time in seasonal staff housing at camp will understand that a small, private apartment is pretty good. The 2004 jobs also prepared me for living where I work, which is the case here in Nome, also.

Third, the Nome Covenant Church is a small church. For the last seven and a half years I have attended Arvada Covent Church in Colorado. Arvada Covenant has an attendance of around 1,000 people on Sundays. That is a big switch, but the first church I attended when I became a Christian was a very small Baptist church in Illinois. I never thought I would go to a church the size of Arvada Covenant. So, I am enjoying the church here. I already feel at home and I know that it will only get better as I get to know the people better and figure out what ministries to get involved in.

Another of my first impressions is how important and awesome it is that God has provided Christian radio to this remote area. I'm also amazed that He has brought me here to be a part of this ministry. I think about how important Christian radio and music have been in my life. Music can often touch us in a way that words alone cannot. Many times that I have been down or just struggling with

We have just barely passed the halfway point in fundraising.


Operation Blanket Nome continues to move forward. During the past month, we have received \$650.00 in donations.
