

Savoonga Enjoys Their Listener Appreciation Dinner.

n Saturday the 25th of September, the staff of KICY boarded a twin-engine plane and flew to the village of Savoonga on St. Lawrence Island, approximately 160 miles from Nome. The trip was to be a way of showing the station's appreciation for our listeners and to bring encouragement to a village whose people have been experiencing a trying time.

We flew in supplies for a spaghetti dinner the KICY staff would prepare at the school cafeteria. We made sure we were set up in the kitchen at the school then went back to the parsonage at the Presbyterian Church where we met up with Dorcas Bloom, now a resident of Nome. She was born and raised in the village of Savoonga and still has a number of family members on the island. It was a great privilege to learn some history of the church and her family, and to take a

short walking-tour of the village and shoreline of the island. The signs of traditional native life, still being practiced, were all along the black sand of the lava rock shore. Meat was air-drying A split walrus hide was stretched on a frame. Bones of sea mammals were bleaching out in the snowy fall weather of St. Lawrence Island.



Back at the school, Dennis cooked up two kettles of spaghetti sauce, a huge mound of pasta, ten loaves of garlic bread, and a small pool of punch. The KICY staff began serving at 6 p.m., and within the hour we had served 125 people. It was great fun for the KICY staff to serve and interact with the people of Savoonga. I especially enjoyed the children. My mispronunciation of their native names brought forth smiles and laughter. The harder I tried the more they laughed.

After dinner, the activity moved to the sanctuary of the Presbyterian Church where Tim Sergie, a Native pastor, led a sizeable crowd in a SingSpiration time, which was broadcast live on KICY-AM. The service lasted several hours, with lots of singing and sharing by a number of people. Tim brought words of hope, encouragement, and challenge to all who attended.

Sunday after worship at the church, we packed up, boarded the plane for the flight back to Nome, less the supplies for the spaghetti dinner, but carrying in our hearts a clearer understanding of what our service at KICY means to the church in Savoonga and to all that the radio signal reaches, broadcasting the gospel of Jesus Christ, who brings forgiveness for yesterday, joy for today, and hope for tomorrow.

It is wonderful to be part of something that has a history of being so clearly ordained by God.

The burden of alcoholism, abuse and suicide in this region of Alaska was also immediately evident when we arrived. We have heard many family members tell the story of their loved ones who had died Nearly every person has lost a close friend or family member to suicide. It is obvious that this problem of depression weighs heavily on the hearts and minds of the staff at KICY, and it is their desire to help bring light into a place where the darkness is thick and complex.

One of the jobs delegated to me at KICY is to process support donations into the computer. It has been so awesome to see where the station support comes from. It arrives from all corners of the country, and from people of all different walks of life. It is amazing to see that the faithfulness of the donors plays such a huge part in what KICY is doing,

and it helped me and others out here at the station to feel a real connection with the rest of the church body.

Josh has learned the station computer systems and recording technology in no time and is helping with the morning shows, recording voice tracks, contacting bands and worship teams for free CD's to play on the air, and many other things. We are looking forward to what God will bring our way in the next year, and giving thanks for what has already happened!
