Bible Trivia Contest Draws Teams from Lower 48.

On January 20th, we launched the first annual, Dr. Phil's Bible Trivia Challenge. We had no idea if anyone would take three hours out of a Saturday afternoon to play Bible Trivia, but we set out to find out.

Prizes were sought from sponsors in the community and Dr. Phil and his wife, Lisa ended up with over 70 prizes to divide among the winners. This included airfares to several western Alaska destinations, hotel accommodations, theatre tickets, footlong Subway sandwiches, prepaid phone cards, specialty coffee drinks, even a \$100 in home heating oil.

The contestants had a week to register their team and we even put a notice on our website. To our surprise, three teams registered from Wisconsin. Another dozen teams registered from western Alaska.


The entire staff was on hand to answer the five phone lines we routed from various offices in the studio building to the lobby. Dr. Phil Schobert and Dennis Weidler were

the on-air hosts asking the trivia questions and playing Praise and Worship songs to give everyone time to do a little digging and call in with the correct answer.

In the traffic office, the Controller for Nome Joint Utilities, Mike Cusak, had developed a special Excel Spreadsheet into which he had entered all of the team names and numbers to facilitate the scoring of the contest. Luda and Lisa took the answer slips from the phone operators and delivering them to Mike with the spreadsheet.

After three hours and some of the most challenging questions ever conceived, a clear winner emerged. From Nome, it was the team known as Soldiers for Christ with a day-long total of 220 points. Right behind them and firmly in second place was the Seventh Day Adventist Church team with

In 1990, Jim was elected to the Arctic Broadcasting Assn. Board of Directors and in 1997, became Campus Administrator of Mount Miguel Covenant Village, Spring Valley, CA.

Jim retired in 2001, to work part time as a real estate escrow agent. In 2005, he became a Covenant Estate Planning Officer, serving part-time at Mt. Miguel Covenant Village and in 2006, Jim became a full time Covenant Estate Planning Officer, serving Arizona and Southern California. ■

Tim Sergie Records 18 Hours of the Shaktoolik Get-Together.

We thank God for opportunities like this. Pastor Tim, our Breakfast Club morning radio host, was invited to speak at the recent Shaktoolik/Koyuk Get-Together. This is four day, annual event hosted by the Shaktoolik Covenant Church, located at the eastern end of Norton Sound.

Just before Christmas, we invested in a new, self contained digital recording device called an H4-ZOOM. The device records high quality digital, stereo audio directly onto an SD chip. From here, it can easily and quickly be downloaded into our computer software for quick editing and uploading into our broadcast system.

Tim took the new unit with him and recorded over 18 hours of native singing on three tiny digital chips. Fortunately, Tim kept great records of the singers and the songs so we can edit the files and get them directly into our on-air playlists. What a blessing this little device has turned out to be. In fact, Nome Public Schools bought one through us for their music department, Tim purchased his own unit and we use one to record the Nome Covenant Church worship service every Sunday morning.

This is the right tool at the right time to allow us to add more Inupiaq, and other languages directly into KICY. ■


