travel to Nome for the games, so KICY provides an extremely valuable service with our live coverage of basketball action.



for the many requests we receive.

Lon has also stepped in to help with our expansive basketball coverage. Lon and George have been sharing duties as Board Operators for the games, controlling the many elements which make up the broadcasts.

Tower Lights to be Converted to LED's. Expect Huge Power Savings.

The costs for converting tower lights to LED's have dropped dramatically over the past three years. In fact, today we can convert three towers to efficient, money-saving LED's for about a third of the cost of three years ago. It's like getting three-for-one!

But the big news is the energy savings and the resulting financial savings we will enjoy. In the Lower 48, the average return on investment is about three years. In Bush Alaska, it's closer to eleven months! We will be able to save nearly \$9,000 a year in electricity a year. Add to that the savings we'll enjoy by not having to hire bonded

and insured tower climbers, pay for their travel to Nome and a supply of the old-style tungsten bulbs and we could see total savings of nearly \$125,000 over 10 years.

The average life expectancy of a tungsten bulb, even the new long-life bulbs, is about two years in the arctic. The new generation of LED's are warranted for a minimum of ten years.

An added bonus is that the new LED's are actually much brighter than the old light bulbs. Keep this project in prayer. We have already contacted Towers For Jesus to help us with the installation this summer.
