he only constant is change. So L it goes here in the arctic, as well. New volunteers, an upgrade in technology and greater reliability all add up to make 2014 a very exciting time to serve at KICY.

This fall, we suffered many computer failures as motherboards and



harddrives exceeded their life expectancy. That forced us to invest in new Windows 8 computers for the four critical

sites at the station. The AM and FM studios, the main office and the General Manager's computers were all updated. That transition presented a few 'learning curve' challenges. At the same time, high speed broadband arrived in Nome with a new fiber optic cable and microwave path from Anchorage. Data speeds have increased from just over 512 kbs to 6 meg per second. But we still have data caps, so we have to be careful with the new service as it is very easy to exceed the caps and then the meter really starts to spin and the costs quickly escalate.

But everyone at KICY has been enjoying the new improvements as most of our programs are downloaded from the internet. Nearly none are provided on CD-ROM. It is a blessing to be able to join the rest of the 'connected' world.

The last of the Windows 98 Computers is retired.

 \mathbf{V} e love them. We are frustrated by them. We have come to rely on them. Yes, I am talking about computers. The broadcast chain is dominated by computers, and up until Christmas, some were 12 years old running on an unsupported operating system, Windows 98.

As of the New Year, all of the old computers have been replaced with new systems running Windows 7. At the same time, we upgraded hard drive space from 36 Gigabytes to 500 Gigabytes. We had filled the old drives with music (which we thought we would never do in 2001).

Today, the new network allows for the seamless flow of data and music, a redundant storage drive and ample room to increase our music content.

KICY already has one of the largest libraries of native Alaskan singing. There is also a very large library of Russian Christian music which Luda has compiled over her years here.

When we lost the hard drives on one

of the computers before Thanksgiving, I quickly began transferring the music libraries into a spare drive. We certainly didn't want to lose the music we had worked for decades to collect.

By the first week of the year, all 9 computers on the broadcast local area network were working as a team and not one element was lost in the transition.

Fortunately, we had kept the licensing current with our automation supplier. As a result, we upgraded the computers and the software, but there was no additional cost. The licensing also provided 24 hour telephone support. Yes, we spent many hours on the phone and even more time linked directly from Texas to our system here in Nome. This is another time when the upgraded internet connection was a huge benefit.

2014 is looking good!

The Murdock Charitable Trust Approves Grant Funding.

In December, KICY received the official announcement that the Murdock Charitable Trust of Vancouver, Washington has approved our grant request for \$150,000 toward the construction of a new, four

unit apartment building.

This is the third grant from the Murdock Charitable Trust since 2006. We

were granted \$30,000 to replace and rebuild the FM tower, antenna and transmitter. In 2008, we received \$70,000 to assist in the rebuilding of the AM transmitter site following the devastating fire. Each was a matching grant. So KICY needs to raise \$150,000, as well.

Housing in Nome is a continuous challenge. The new hospital needs to hire 125 additional staff. The Nome Police Department is constantly being challenged by new hires unable to secure reasonable housing. Every fall, new teachers seek reliable and comfortable housing. It goes on and on.

What will one apartment building do for housing? Honestly, it will barely put a dent in the problem. But it will assure us that there will be no

> problem leasing apartment space to professionals entering the job market in Nome. This will help to stabilize our cash flow as energy costs show no signs of abating. This will allow

KICY to turn a Capital building project, funded in part through the grant and built with volunteer work teams, into positive, monthly cash flow for the operating budget.

Please pray for the successful outcome of the building project this summer as many pieces have to fit together at the right time.

If you enjoy working with your hands and perhaps have some building skills, we would appreciate seeing you in Nome for a week or two.

As Bill Hartman once said, "Some go by giving and some give by going". KICY appreciates both.


