By May, we will be knee-deep into fishing reports and nearly endless sunshine. But for now, we are working with daylight saving time and the local sunset at about 10 pm...already.

This has been a rather moderate winter so far. In January of 2012, we dropped to -42 and stayed there the entire month. This year the average was just below zero. Isn't it great when zero is considered a 'warming trend"?



#### Mitch Seavey Wins Iditarod 41.

Tditarod 2012 saw the youngest I musher ever to win the 1100 mile race from Anchorage to Nome. That was Dallas Seavey. This year it was the oldest musher to ever win the Iditarod. It was 53 year-old Mitch Seavey. Yes, he's Dallas' dad. Last year three generations of Seaveys competed in the same race with Grandad Dan finishing near the back of the pack. To say the Seaveys represent a dog mushing dynasty would be an understatement. Oh, yes, did we mention that Conway Seavey, Dallas' younger brother, won the Junior Iditarod? All in a day's mush, one might think.

Our coverage team included Patty Burchell, a former KICY volunteer and now an Arctic Broadcasting board member. She provided race analysis from the starting line to the finish in Nome. Lon Swanson drove Mobile One (the blue van) out past Farley's Camp on the Council Road

and tracked the mushers back into Nome. Ian Coglan and Stephen Palmatier manned the scaffolding in our 'eye in the sky' directly above the finish line. Thanks to Nome Covenant Church for letting us erect our perch on church property. And, Dr. Phil Schobert handled the man-on-thestreet interviews chatting it up with out of town visitors and locals alike.

Temperatures hovered near, and often below zero as Mitch, followed 25 minutes later by number two musher, Aliy Zirkle made their way into Nome. Ms. Zirkle came in second last year as well, following the younger Seavey into town.

With Mitch safely into Nome at 10:39 pm, there was a continuous stream of finishers coming off the trail for the next 24 hours. It was a great race with few incidents.

### KICY Installs Sound System For The City of Nome.



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Right after Christmas, the City of Nome contacted KICY about upgrading the sound system at the City's venue called the Mini-Convention Center. This site also goes by the name of the Iditarod Headquarters. It seems that at the last few events, no one could hear the presentation. The city wanted the Iditarod visitors to avoid that same situation.

KICY had installed the PA system on Front Street to announce the mushers arriving into Nome. We had also installed the sound system at the Lutheran Church in Nome, and at the Unalakleet Covenant Church last spring just before the statewide conference. There is also a new system at the Shaktoolik Covenant Church.

By mid-January we had ordered nearly \$10,000 worth of electronics, although a full one-third of that cost was for shipping.

A few weeks before Iditarod, all of the various parts and pieces had arrived and the KICY 'audio team' went to work with the installation. We also took time to decommission much of the old equipment still bolted to the walls. The result was a new sound system where everyone can hear...all the way back to the restrooms in the back of the hall. The hall also looked much cleaner with the removal of the old gear.

On March 24th, we had our first real trial run with a live musical performer. The fastest flat pick guitar player in the world, Dennis Agajanian, came to Nome to play at our Sunday morning service as well as a community concert on Sunday evening.

Even Dennis, who plays in a variety of venues around the world, was extremely happy with the sound. So was the crowd which had gathered for the concert!



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## Nome Covenant to be gifted a new church building.


A fter 15 years, our pastor's and our church's steadfast prayers have been answered.

The Nome Covenant Church building holds many special memories of weddings and funerals. Of baptisms and VBS. For over 60 years the little church at the corner of Front and Bering Streets has been a bright beacon to the citizens of Nome and the entire region. But it is a church which is, like many of us, beginning to show signs of age. There are cables across the sanctuary holding the building together. There are rotting timbers below us. There are not enough pews so we place folding chairs in the aisles to

handle all the worshippers.

Enter Dennis Agajanian, who travels with Franklin Graham and performs worship music as the fastest guitar picker in the world. After a recent concert in Nome, Dennis thought the church could use a new sanctuary. The church's condition didn't escape his attention.



We were unaware at the time, but he was flying to Japan with Franklin and mentioned the Nome Covenant Church. Of course, Franklin Graham is a former Nomeite and was aware of the Covenant Church. He also has a great heart for bush Alaska and understands our challenges. He committed Samaritan's Purse to the construction of a new building, which will nearly double our seating capacity. The old building will come down in May and we hope to be in the new church by November. We are constantly praising God for
