The snow has nearly all disappeared but the cool temperatures remain. The musk oxen, moose families and the Grizzly bears are becoming hot topics with warnings from the Nome Police Department as well as Fish & Game.

We have begun our annual tradition of broadcasting fishing reports. Starting in Mid-May and continuing through Mid-September, we provide the latest in openings, closures, even net sizes.

There are reports for Herring, Salmon, Halibut and Crab in Norton Sound, Unalakleet and the Lower Yukon. Summer is a very busy time for those who fish or support the fishing industry.

June is the month of the Midnight Sun Festival, this year falling on the correct weekend of June 21st. There are bank robberies, the Polar Bear Swim, the Folk Fest music festival and the Sunday afternoon Raft Race down the Nome River. While the 21st is the longest day, it rarely gets dark from the first of May through July. Add to the extended sunlight the fact that there are no trees for shade and you begin to understand why the warmest part of the day is 10 o'clock at night. Arctic living takes some adaptation. ■


