Workteams Give Studio Building A Needed Facelift.

Three volunteer work-teams made great progress this year in our remodeling and restoration projects. The newly named Fondell Broadcast Center got new exterior siding, a new coat of paint and much needed Tyvek wrapping and insulation.

The first team of Terry Reynolds, Sonny Chambers and Ed Carlson from Eagle River, Alaska replaced 450 feet of control cable between the phasor building and the transmitter. One wire failed last winter causing our directional pattern to shift without muting the transmitter so a 'shower of sparks' scorched nearly all of our big contactor switches. The team also replaced the contactors and rocker arms of those switches.

Covenant in Farmington Hills, Michigan cleaned out 50 years of debris and leveled (made it straight) the studio building, re-tacked the insulation underneath and began the siding replacement project. They also hosted a VBS for the children of Nome in

Anvil City Square. By Friday evening, attendance had grown to over 70!

The father-son team of Rob and Fred Menko made us a swell new sign for the transmitter site. It's 16 feet wide and 8 feet tall.

The third team from Tucson, Arizona completed the siding project and, in the process, replaced all of the windows in Lon's apartment, removed three other windows on the first floor
