




Salmon Dinner dates are filling up around the Midwinter Conference but there are East Coast openings in April.

I am happy to report that our license renewal process with the Federal Communications Commission is wrapped up and the application documents are on record in Washington, D.C. and in our Public File. This is a once-every-sevenyears event and there are lots of little details. We should receive our final licenses in February.

Lon was able to travel to the Village of Teller for the Lutheran Fall Conference. He recorded the music and preaching each evening and also broadcast the Saturday evening service. As we had some technical failures, we decided to rebroadcast the conference a few weeks later. It was great to have Covenant Pastor, Joel Oyoumick from Unalakleet sharing the message each evening.

Major Building Project For 2014 Announced.

In order to provide a more stable I financial future for KICY, and a much needed service for the community of Nome, the Arctic Broadcasting Association Board of Directors has announced plans to construct a Four-Plex Apartment Building on property adjoining the current studio site.

"We hope to build the four-plex this coming summer. We already have commitments from several churches to send work teams to Nome to help in the project," stated ABA President, Sister Olson-Johnson. "The rent from the four-plex will help to stabilize cash flow, in light of our increasing power expenses. KICY isn't using more power than in the past several years, but the costs per kilowatt hour continue to escalate."

Fundraising for this project kicks off in earnest this month. We have applied for a matching grant and that process continues to move forward. The balance of the \$325,000 project, or \$150,000 we pray will come from our supporters.

This process began a few years ago, when the owner of the property adjacent to the KICY studios indicated that she would like Arctic Broadcasting to benefit from her property in some way. Today we have a purchase agreement and a closing date on the near horizon. How best to use the property? First, there is a huge housing shortage in Nome. There have been several new city hires who had to cancel their plans to move to Nome simply because they could not find a place to live. While a 4-plex won't solve all those issues, it will represent a large improvement.

Power costs, housing shortages and an opportunity to acquire property led us prayerfully to the decision to build an apartment.

KICY Team Provides Audio Visual Installation Service For The New Church.

The culmination of months of planning paid off as the KICY work team crawled under the new Covenant church in Nome to install a 100 foot long snake.

Included in the length of cable

were a 24 pair audio line, coaxial cable, three speaker lines, a CAT 6 line and a pull string for future additions.

Over several days, Lon, Ian and Dennis pushed the lines through 60 feet of PVC. On the last day, the section which will be the feed point from the new audio visual center, was run up through the floor and into the back of where the booth will eventually be located.

Two other sets of cables were run, one from the very top of the ceiling in the sanctuary and three other cables to control remote video cameras were fished from the ceiling above the future audio visual booth.

That wrapped up the new sanctuary cabling. But we weren't fin-

ished. Each of the new Sunday School rooms and the Fellowship Hall needed their own coaxial cable, CAT 6 and overhead speaker volume control.

It was a huge project and the KICY Team was happy to be a part of it all.
