L have to admit we have had a glorious fall here in the arctic. It seemed to arrive a little early but then backed off and provided many beautiful days to get out and enjoy the colors and smells of the season. I love the smell of fall. We did have a few days of heavy rain which

ready for winter. Most of the siding went on that week, as well.

Now we are in a period of encouraging smaller work teams (five or six) due to housing restraints. But we are looking at expanding to year-round opportunities. Imagine the fun of being here for Iditarod, watching the canine athletes arrive in Nome and be able to help with some of the detail work at the Triplex or other interior housing projects. It has taken over 15 years to get to this point but most of the major, exterior work is behind us.

There is still much to do to renovate the staff apartments, but smaller teams will work better, especially in confined spaces.

I want to thank my wife, Candace, for her willingness to partner with me for over 15 years of service in the arctic. You're the best!

Capacitors Replaced In AM Transmitter.

Part of the Eagle River work team was tasked with a side project, unrelated to the construction of the Triplex this summer. Arctic Broadcasting President, Terry Reynolds and his son-in-law, Roy Pace teamed up with General Manager, Dennis Weidler to replace all the big, blue electrolytic capacitors in the 50,000 watt AM transmitter.

The capacitors have about a ten year life span and the transmitter is over 14 years old. It was time for some preventive maintenance.

The team of three set out right after CareForce on a Tuesday morning and began the swap. In what we believe was a record amount of time, approximately 4 and 1/2 hours, all capacitors were replaced and we prayed that when we pushed the Low Power button, the transmitter would return to life. It did. All went well and the transmitter performed flawlessly at Medium and High Power. The station was back on the air...before lunch break.

Terry also took this time to assure that the directional pattern was locked in to the correct values. As seasons change, the parameters can drift a little. We were well within the F.C.C. dictated values so Terry just tweaked things to be exact.

We also took this off-air time to open the ATU cabinets at the base of each tower and make sure all the components were securely mounted and hadn't been victims of wind vibration teamed with extremely cold temperatures. All appeared normal.

Now, with winter approaching, we'll seal the cabinets back up.


