Tower Repairs

n early July our AM transmitter began behaving erratically. After a few days of troubleshooting the transmitter and transmission lines, we were still no closer to an answer. At the end of that week. Nate was out at the tower site to begin some work on the roof of the phasor building. When he opened the door, he saw a haze and the smell was acrid. I joined him at the site and while thoroughly inspecting the phasor, we found the problem. One of the tuning rods had burned up leaving it as slag on the floor of one of the cabinets.

The cause was unknown until closer inspection of the ground straps. When I got to the base of the West Tower, I found one of the spark gap balls on the ground, rather than bolted to the base of the tower. The copper "pig tail" connecting the tuning unit to the tower had become disconnected as well. Apparently, that disconnect caused the tuning rod to melt.

A new tuning coil, rod and knob were ordered and shipped to Steve Smit, a former volunteer at KICY and current broadcast engineer in Minnesota, who volunteered to come make the repair. As an essential worker, Steve was able to come in, follow health and safety protocols, and get right to work. Steve also gladly shared his expertise with Cody and Nate, who learned much about our towers and tuning system under Steve's tutelage.

Between the time the issue was discovered and its repair we were not able to go into our directional mode overnight, but were able to stay on the air at reduced power. Fortunately, once the repair was made it was determined nothing else had been harmed. The transmitter is happy once again and our signal into Russia overnight is strong.

A Look Back...

Broadcast to Russia

Outreach to Russia has always been part of the vision at KICY. Below are excerpts from the past indicating the growth of KICY's Russian Ministry.

Memories from Winfield Dean, summer volunteer in 1964:

In early July, the Rev. Peter

Dyneka, Director of the Slavic Gospel Mission, paid a visit. Ralph (Fondell) arranged for him to speak on one of the evening programs in Russian. This was the first time KICY broadcast in Russian, and it became a dream to develop broadcasts that would reach to

the Russian people. Ralph did hear back later that the broadcast was heard in Russia and that they desired more programs.


From the Spring 1968 Call Letter:

KICY received its first letter from across the Iron Curtain in March. The listener, who wrote from north of Moscow, had heard our programs in October of 1966, while he was living near Vladivostok in Siberia. We have been waiting for such a report of reception for several years. We hope that this is just the beginning of future reports from our friends across the Bering Straits.

From the Spring 1972 Call Letter:

Russian programming will soon become a reality on KICY. From 11-11:45 each evening Gospel programs in the Russian language will be aired reaching not only those Alaskans of Russian background, but reaching Siberians as well with the good news of Jesus Christ. Approval was received from

the FCC with our license renewal this spring.

Russian Gospel Temple of San Francisco, has now notified us of at least two actual letters they have received from Russian language listeners who have heard their program on KICY.

From the Spring 1978 Call Letter:

KICY's programs are being heard in Siberia. In February a Chukchi author and leader...told us in a broadcast interview that he could hear KICY. ...He said when he visits his summer home in Provideniya, the capital city of Chukotka, ...using his words... "Sometime I hear you, maybe your voice." ... Although we've known that we have listeners in Alaska to our 45 minutes of Russian Christian programs in the late evening hours, this comes as really exciting information.

Today, KICY's signal is turned directional West every day at 11 p.m. and broadcasts in the Russian language from 11 p.m. to 4 a.m., sending the message of the Gospel into the heart of Eastern Russia and beyond. A Prayer Request For each of our staff members




