In addition to being former players themselves, they have both lived in Nome long enough that they know all the players and can add a sense of history to the current season. KICY partners with other radio stations in the localities where the teams are playing to receive coverage for the away games. Gratefully, Josie is also willing and available to travel to those communities that don't have local radio stations so families back home can still hear the games.

Both the Nome boys' and girls' teams have had a strong start this season. They will play every weekend in January and February, and the way things are going, have a good possibility of playing in the state tournament in March.

A Look Back

Throughout our 60th Anniversary year we will be taking a look back at historical publications, bringing you exerpts from the early days of KICY. In this edition, we reprint excerpts from an an article penned by Ralph Fondell in 1962 as part of a Covenant Church publication. It could have been written today, as both the question, and the answer are still valid.

It was Easter Sunday, April 17, 1960, when radio station KICY first broadcast the message of

salvation to western Alaska.
Looking in retrospect over the past two years, the question comes to mind-- "Is KICY serv-

ing the purpose for which it was established?" The chief purposes are to reach souls for the Lord Jesus Christ and to edify Christians. KICY is a missionary radio station working together with the missionaries, native pastors and laymen on the field.

In a village on the lower Yukon a young man recently came to the Lord. He had been brought up in a Christian home but he, himself, had been extremely critical of Christianity. However, by listening to the various gospel broadcasts over KICY, primarily the "Eskimo Hour," the barriers were broken down and he came to the missionary seeking spiritual help. In other villages there are those who have started coming to the regular church services where missionaries and pastors are able to reach some who heretofore have been opposed or ignorant of the message of Christ.

...It was at the 75th Anniversary Conference of Alaska Covenant Churches in Unalakleet recently that Reuben Paniptchuk, pastor at Shaktoolik, remarked in conversation that he thought that KICY is one of the greatest things that has happened to western Alaska.

It was there at Unalakleet that an Eskimo woman mentioned to us how much she is blessed by the gospel broadcasts. "Even before I was a Christian," she said, "every Sunday evening I would make certain the children were in bed and the house quiet and then I would crawl into bed, turn on the radio and listen to 'Lutheran Vespers' and the message spoke right to me."

Steffan Katchetag, a man of God

who has been an invalid for a number

of years, described the Christian programs as "bread of heaven to feed him spiritually each day."
...Is KICY serving the purposes for which it was intended? In some instances it has been KICY's privilege to plant the seed; in others it has been to water that which has been planted by faithful pastors and missionaries. But, in every instance, we know that it is God alone who

A KICY Salmon Dinner is a great opportunity to introduce members of your congregation and community at large to the






