An Unplanned Flight.

n Thursday, January 28th I woke up with an ache in my chest that would not go away. I showered, dressed and went down to the AM studio. The pain was still there. I took an inventory, trying to isolate the location of the pain. It was not a pain that I had experienced before. It was an irritating cramp in the middle of the chest that wouldn't allow me to inhale freely. "Doggone it," I thought. "Guess I should do something about it." I called George, another KICY volunteer, and told him I was not feeling well and going to the hospital. I put my coat on and since the hospital is only four blocks away, I started walking. (Oh, what a Swede I am.) On my way, I was almost to the police station when two officers in a patrol car stopped to ask if I was all right, and if they could help. "Well," I started, trying not to make it a big deal, "I'm having some chest pain and I'm heading to the hospital to get it checked out." "Get in the patrol car." They said. I did. At the Norton Sound Hospital emergency room, they put me right

on the gurney. All I could do was let the ER staff do what they do. It was all out of my control. I received excellent care as they treated the symptoms. They got my heart under control and prepared me to be medivaced to Anchorge. Oh boy! A plane ride! Oooo.... A very expensive plane ride. Hmmm... Anchorage is definitely too far to walk. I'm thankful for the staff at Norton Sound Hospital.

I had missed a previous medivac by fifteen minutes and it would take another 45 minutes to get a pilot and flight nurse. While waiting, we were able to get the family and friend phone tree going. I was transported by ambulance to the airport and was able to walk onto the plane and on to the stretcher. There were two flight nurses. Maybe there was more wrong with me than I thought. They had me on oxygen, an IV, and monitored my heart all the way to Anchorage. The flight --continued on Page 2

There's lots to do and the volunteers to do it. Keep their travels in your prayers.



get out of Nome and then out of Alaska, our goal is to schedule at least three dinners in one "Salmon Tour". Four would be even better.


