New Iditarod Arch



t was known the posts that held the spruce crosspiece of the Iditarod Arch had been deteriorating, but before they could be replaced the arch collapsed in April of last year. It had served as the Iditarod Finish Line for 25 years, the same length of time the first arch lasted. Ramey Smyth was commissioned to craft a new burled arch. Ramey comes from a mushing family deeply committed to the Iditarod. His father, Bud, was part of the first race and ran the trail an additional 5 times. His mother, Lolly Medley, was one of two women to run the second Iditarod in 1974. Ramey's brother Cim is a multiple time Iditarod finisher. Ramey has finished 26 times, many in the top 10, and in the late 1990s and early 2000s consistently had the fastest time from Safety to Nome. Ramey is a contractor who builds

exquisite log homes, and the perfect choice to craft a new finish line arch. After an extensive search Ramey found an ideal spruce near Mile One of the Historic Iditarod Mail Trail that once connected Seward to Nome. The tree was felled in January, dried, stripped of bark, shaped, and carved. Bryan Mills, a woodworker and Iditarod finisher, assisted. The lettering and other symbols on the crosspiece were first burned into the wood, then painted, turning it into a family affair as his wife and children lent a hand. The pieces were shipped to Nome and assembled by Ramey, Bryan, and a team from Public Works. This beautiful piece of art, well crafted to last at least the next 25 years, was unveiled in a ceremony on Front Street the day before this year's first place finisher, Jessie Holmes, arrived.



Russian Programming Update

ong time Russian Language Programmer, Luda Kinok, stepped down from that role last May and since then many have been asking about the future of our Russian language programming. Over the years,

Luda interacted with her listeners in different ways. Most recently she was the announcer between songs, the "voice" of the Russian programming, much like our AM and FM announcers are the "voice" of the English language programming. Programs in Russian remain, there is just not a recognizable voice present during the broadcasts.

While we seek a new full time



Russian Language Programmer, we are evaluating the programming we have. Our content is biblically sound. However, for many programs, we have not received new episodes for several years. Oksana Sobie and her husband Scott are in Nome for the time being, displaced from their home in Ukraine where Scott was a missionary pastor for 20 years. Oksana has begun listening to our current programs and will be making recommendations. She has also found more Russian Christian music to add to our lineup.

Russian language programming is still a priority at KICY. Praise God for Oksana's help in evaluating what we air. Pray that God would provide a full time staff member to add that personal touch and voice to the broadcasts.


