## Lon Swanson holds our official certifications. We Are Certified.

It has been a very good year for KICY AM & FM. First, both licenses were renewed by the Federal Communications Commission on February 2. Those renewals are good for eight years.

Then, on May 17th, we underwent a voluntary FCC inspection and passed with flying colors. This certification is good for three years and means we will most likely not be inspected by the FCC in that time period.

As members of both the Alaska Broadcasters Association and the National Association of Broadcasters, KICY participates in this unique program of voluntary inspection. Through a barter arrangement with Alaska Broadcasters, KICY airs spot advertisements for a variety of state sponsored programs, the Coast Guard, the National Guard and even an alternative high school. These ads help to offset the cost of the voluntary inspections.

This same program allows the FCC to concentrate on areas of greatest

concern and not on the time consuming activities involved with traveling all over bush Alaska to inspect one or two radio stations, most of which are at least 500 miles from the nearest road. That is a very expensive proposition for the Commission.

The voluntary inspection includes all the elements of a regular FCC visit including review of the Public File, transmitter and engineering logs, Emergency Alert System inspection, a visit to the transmitter site to review tower painting, lighting and fencing and, in the case of KICY, to make sure the directional monitoring points are within tolerance. Of course, this year that wasn't an issue as we are operating on a Special Temporary Authority to be non-directional 24 hours a day.

Thanks to Ken Benner, who is retained by the Alaska Broadcasters, for the great inspection. He is always extremely helpful.

It's always a time of great joy when Genesis Recording is busy assisting in the production of new music for KICY.

Over Memorial weekend, well known song writer and recording artist, Cyndi Reeves traveled from the village of Alakanak in the Yukon Delta to Nome to visit her parents. She was 'retiring' from her teaching position after ten years. She and her family were heading to Craig, Alaska down in the southeast.

She took some time out of her visit to record an entire CD of new songs. She is a prolific songwriter. This is at least her third recording session this year and it's only June! She also spent part of her time adding harmony tracks to some of her previous recordings. Then, it was time for the entire family to record. Cyndi's father and mother, Tim and Martha Sergie joined her in the studio and recorded a second CD of regional favorites, many sung in their native Central Yup'ik.

There is still time which needs to be devoted to finishing the recordings. Cyndi's multitrack sessions have to be edited and mixed and the family recordings were tracked on our 8 channel analogue recorder. These need to be mixed to digital stereo and mastered to CD.

We are all anxious to get the new material on as we have recently expanded our Native Language singing portion of our weekend programming. If you get a chance check out the Weekend Get Togethers on our audio stream at www.kicy.org.


In addition, KICY presented the Broadcasters Award to Anna Ashenfelter for her work at both KICY AM-850 and ICY 100.3 FM.


