→ he year was 1998 and I was a 6th grade teacher in Califor nia. I had felt the call of God early in my life toward missions, but aside from a couple of short summer experiences, had not yet begun to discover what that call meant for me. I had thought dedi-



cating myself to a life of missions meant going to some far away place to do great things for God. But in fact, I was

slowly coming to see that missions is a way of life, not a location. God had placed me in the public schools in California, which was definitely a mission field, even though it was in my home state.

tower team from Nolan Brothers arrived May 27th to begin the arduous task of replacing over 900 braces on two of our towers. The weather was questionable, but with the promise of sunny days ahead the team began the rigging process. The skies cleared and steady progress has been made with two teams of two on each tower and a runner on the ground. The team will spend about three weeks, working long hours each day, bolting each one in place. Weather is always a factor, and we are trusting it will remain calm and rain-free for the duration of the project.

Thanks to all who have made the financial portion of this project possible. What a blessing to have so many donors giving, allowing us to reap the benefit of the matching grant from the Murdock Foundation. As reported in the last Call Letter, we are fully funded because of your generosity.

We are praising God that we can make these repairs without having to take down the towers. This means that we can still be on the air evenings and overnight, at least at low power.

If all goes well, we will be back on the air 24 hours a day, at full power, by the end of June. Pray with us for continued good weather and safety for the tower team as they complete this project so critical to KICY.



Inupiaq New Testaments Arrive

nupiaq Bibles have arrived! Published by Wycliff and the International Bible League, these New Testaments are in one of the native languages of Northwest Alaskans. With easy-to-read text and line drawn illustrations, the words of Scripture come alive.

Native Alaskans in the region are recovering thier language with many schools now offering native language classes. Over the years, songs and hymns have been both translated to, and written in, Inupiat, as well as the other native languages in the region. Many of these songs have been recorded at Village Get-Togethers over the

years and are played on KICY during Singspiration Time each day.

Native language readings of Scripture have been a part of the broadcast day on KICY since its beginning. We currently play sections of Scripture in Inupiaq, recorded by Wycliffe Bible Translators, during our Singspiration Time each weekend.
