I've never spent a summer looking forward to winter!

But, forms were built, concrete was poured (under a tent) and a building was constructed. Praise



God for volunteer teams who don't mind working in the rain.

We have met our financial goal for the first phase of Operation Ready Power and are looking forward to next year and phase two. This will provide emergency standby power for the AM transmitter site. We will need to purchase a 125 kw diesel generator. Our preliminary plans call for it to be built into a shipping container which will also serve as its permanent home once placed into position at the transmitter site.

We are continually encouraged by calls and e-mails we receive from our listeners. It confirms we are meeting the daily, spiritual needs of those inside and outside of our vast coverage area, made even larger through the internet.

Standby Power Fully Functional.

In spite of the dismal weather, the summer work teams really came through and finished the first phase of Operation Ready Power. As of Friday, July 25th, the new generator building, the standby generator and the automatic transfer switch were put to their first test. The main disconnect switch was thrown at about 1:00 pm. 27 seconds later, the power came back on, delivered by the diesel generator.

To put the new system to the test, we turned on all the computers plus the electric dryer in the laundry room and an oven or two. There wasn't even a hiccup.

I stand in awe of what can be accomplished by dedicated servants to God's kingdom. In fewer than 60 days a new 400 square foot building was constructed and the new power generation system was installed. The one single thing remaining to be finished is the painting of the exterior of the new building which can wait until next year when the sun may actually shine and the paint may dry.

Fortunately, the new Phasor Building, which we built last year, received a fresh, new coat of paint during a two day window when it wasn't raining. It looks great, too.

The south end of the studio building, which had lost siding during a winter storm last year, is all snugged down for the upcoming winter. We replaced the old siding with new T-1-11 and even wrapped that part of the building with Tyvek. Again, the hard work of dedicated work teams saved our bacon.

Even with the rainy weather and heavy workload, there was time for some Humpy (Pink Salmon) fishing, with one team catching over 100 fish in a two hour period.

In case you are wondering, we do have a need for some remodeling next year, too!
