internet service. Just a few short years ago all data was capped, very expensive, and slow. About five years ago Quintillion installed an

undersea fiber line and soon after high speed internet came to Nome. About the same time the satellite over which we got much of our programming was decommissioned. All of our nationally produced programming is now downloaded through the internet. In early June that undersea fiber line was cut near Barrow by ice shearing. We are back to internet speeds even less than pre-fiber as the providers in Nome seek a workaround while the repair crews wait for the ice to recede enough to allow for a repair. It has been a stark reminder as to just how dependent we are on the internet. And streaming our signal? Just about impossible. They are predicting the cable will be repaired by mid-August. We pray that it is.



ong-time KICY staff member Dave DeVries ran into the arms of Jesus two days following his 82nd birthday.

Dave and Kathy served the summers of 1965 & '66 at KICY before being commissioned as Covenant Missionaries in 1967. They raised their family in Nome, serving until 1982. During his 17 years with KICY Dave filled a number of roles. Not only was he in charge of sales and other business aspects at the station, but also covered news and sports,

managed the Eskimo and Russian language broadcasting, and even handled mission buildings and grounds. Dave willingly did whatever needed to be done.

After leaving Nome, Dave and Kathy continued serving the greater Covenant Church at Christian camps in Iowa and California before serving many years in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin. Dave was a founding member of Anchor Covenant church in Lake Geneva, which also became their home in retirement.

Friends and family remember Dave as loving, kind, hard-working, full of integrity, and a prayer warrior, among other Christ-like traits. Dave lived life to its fullest and chose joy even when things were hard, especially as his battle with cancer intensified. He delighted in spending time with family and friends and the legacy Dave leaves behind will continue to impact many.
