missionaries Dave and Mitzi Shinen and Amaghalek Beulah Nowpakahok of Gambell shared the story of the

translation and the impact they hope it will make in the lives of the people on St. Lawrence Island. To conclude the service, about twenty native Alaskans who were in attendance from the Island gathered on the platform and laid hands on the Bible, dedicating it to God's purposes.

Radio is all about meaningful communication. Spreading the Good News of the Gospel in languages our listeners understand has always been a priority at KICY. In the early days of the station Gladys Savok and others translated and recorded scripture in Inupiag and Yup'ik that is still played today. And, of course, Russian language broadcasts have always been a priority. What could be better than God's word, shared in a language meaningful to our listeners. To God be the Glory!

ast fall I was contacted by Olivia Garretson, a videographer and owner of Lightshaft Media who had heard of KICY at a Salmon Dinner at her church in Kansas. The story of the ministry impacted her, and she offered to come to Nome to use her gifts and skills to produce a short video or two about KICY for our use. She asked if she could come up for a week in the spring. While it would have been exciting for her to be here at Iditarod time, I knew she would get a better sense of the scope of our ministry if she came during the Annual Meeting of the Alaska Conference of the Covenant Church, which was to be held in Nome in April. She would then be able to speak with and film not only those listeners who are local, but also those from villages in our listeneing area who would be attending the conference.

And so, a few days prior to the start

of the conference, Olivia and her assistant (her dad, Jeff) arrived in Nome. Her talent for telling a story was immediately apparant as she dove right in shooting video and Jeff asked pertinent questions. She produced a one minute "teaser" while here, which captured the essence of the ministry very well.

After a little more than a week in Nome, Olivia and Jeff returned to Kansas and the work of editing began. In late September I received an email from Olivia with the links to the finished products. Those two videos, one intended to be used by churches for 100% Sunday (see p. 4), and one to be used for volunteer recruitment, are now on our website, kicy.org.

We are humbled Olivia has used her God given talents and giftings to bless KICY in this way.


