Moody Broadcasting Installs New Uplink for Alaska.

For at least seven years (as long as my history in Nome) our satellite feed from Moody Broadcasting in Chicago has sounded anywhere from marginal to terrible to completely missing. It turns out that the transponder we were looking at with our big satellite dish was aimed far east, into the Yukon Territory of Canada, to be precise. And, the satellite, which was supposed to be geostationary was wobbling around an area often outside of our signal reception. This made for some extremely poor quality programming from Chicago. But, we felt the content was worth the poor quality. That was until the signal vanished completely, only to return sporadically. Our Moody Broadcasting feed was often gone for days at a time.

At the April Arctic Broadcasting board meeting, I was given approval to cancel our subscription to the Moody Broadcasting Network. However, within an hour of my email expressing our desires, the good folks at Moody Broadcasting emailed back with a proposal to erect a \$50,000 earth station near Chicago at their expense and send a digital, stereo signal right to us in Nome.

Our only expense would be a new satellite receiver, an antenna splitter and a couple of connectors. I was excited at the prospect of having a reliable, high quality program source!

When I returned home from my last three-week fund-raising tour, the new receiver had arrived and was installed in about half an hour. I held my breath and offered a prayer of hope that the new receiver would find the satellite, lock on and begin playing the audio. Praise God, there it was!

As I brought the audio up through the console, it sounded like I was standing in the Moody studios!

We're back.

We wish the best for whatever lies in the future for the Tumbleweeds and thank them for making the Fundraising Dinner in Eagle River an extra special event. Thanks, too, to all those who volunteered to serve that evening. Over a dozen former KICY staff members helped out!



to review the pages of


